Before You Begin – Required Items

Use this upgrade guide to upgrade to software version 6.2.xx. This guide is for nodes running the previous General Availability (GA) releases or the previous Long Term Support (LTS) release, which is 5.15.xx.

Obtaining Software Images

To obtain software images, register on the Gigamon Community portal and download the software. You will need to provide the serial number of any one of the nodes to register and download the software. Use the **show chassis** command to retrieve a node's serial number.

Separate Software Images for Different Nodes

The software image upgrade procedure is slightly different depending on the node you are upgrading. Relevant files and documentation are available on the Gigamon Customer Portal. Note the filenames in Table 2: Required Items for System Upgrade.

Required Items for Upgrades

The following table summarizes the items you will need to perform the upgrade to GigaVUE-OS 6.2.xx:

Node Type/ Version	Protocols	Description
All	FTP, TFTP, SFTP, SCP, HTTP, HTTPS	You will need to fetch the GigaVUE-OS nodes' software packages from a file server using one of the supported protocols. The GigaVUE-OS nodes will need the file server's IP address so that it can connect to the server and download the image.
		Note: There are freeware file servers available on the Internet for a variety of operating systems. A Web search will provide links to many implementations.
		You can also upload a new software build directly from your PC using GigaVUE-FM.

Supported Upgrade Path—Standalone Nodes

Use the GigaVUE-OS Upgrade Summary table to determine the path to upgrade your GigaVUE-OS H Series and GigaVUE-OS TA Series nodes to GigaVUE-OS 6.2.xx.

UPGRADE NOTES:

- All upgrades start and end by saving the node's configuration with the **write memory** command.
- Refer to Upgrade Summary Clustered Nodes for considerations when upgrading nodes in a cluster.
- It is recommended that you enable the syslogs with the minimum severity level set to 'info' to help with troubleshooting upgrade issues, if any. After successful upgrade, you can revert to the desired severity level for the syslogs.
- Upgrading to a fresh image install will reboot the device twice. This behavior is noted in GigaVUE-HC1, GigaVUE-HC3, GigaVUE-TA100 and GigaVUE-TA200.

IMPORTANT— **BEFORE ANY UPGRADE, SAVE YOUR CURRENT CONFIGURATION**. Refer to "Device Configuration Backup" in the *GigaVUE Administration Guide* for guidance.

GigaVUE-OS Upgrade Summary

To upgrade GigaVUE TA Series, GigaVUE-HC1, GigaVUE-HC2, and GigaVUE-HC3 nodes to a 6.2.xx release:

- 1. Use the **show images** command to display the existing image file names. For the maximum number of images allowed, refer to Check Number of Images
- 2. Delete the available image files using the **image delete <filename.img>** command, to create space for the new images.
- 3. Fetch and install the 6.2.xx software image (based on the node information) and bootloader, set next boot, and reload.

IMPORTANT—Before upgrading to 6.2.xx, verify the recommended upgrade path below. For the latest Long Term Support (LTS) release information, refer to the Gigamon Software Life Cycle FAQ article on the Gigamon Community.

VERSION NOTES—The upgrade paths are mostly the same across platforms, with one noted exception:

****5.9.01.16 on GigaVUE-HC1 and GigaVUE-HC2**: When upgrading GigaVUE-HC1 and GigaVUE-HC2 to GigaVUE-OS 5.10.xx, add the 5.9.01.16 hot patch to increase the allowed image size to support the upgrade.

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After 5.10.xx, the upgrade paths are the same across platforms.

*****5.10.04 on GigaVUE-HC3**: When upgrading GigaVUE-HC3 to GigaVUE-OS 5.13.xx or 5.15.xx you must upgrade to 5.10.04 to increase the allowed image size to support the upgrade.

Note: If you are installing the SMT-HC1-S module in a GigaVUE-HC1 Chassis, use the recommended upgrade path specific to this module. Refer to SMT-HC1-S (Gen 3 GigaSMART Card), for details.

GigaVUE-OS Legacy Upgrades

To upgrade GigaVUE TA Series, GigaVUE-HC1, GigaVUE-HC2, and GigaVUE-HC3 from older versions of GigaVUE-OS, prior to v5.6.xx, use the paths specified for the device in Table 3: GigaVUE-OS Upgrade Summary .

VERSION NOTES—The upgrade paths are mostly the same across platforms, with a few noted exceptions:

***5.6 on GigaVUE-HC2**: GigaVUE-HC2 requires upgrading to 5.6.xx prior to upgrading to 5.7.xx due to an increase in the memory requirements.

****5.9.01.16 on GigaVUE-HC1 and GigaVUE-HC2**: When upgrading GigaVUE-HC1 and GigaVUE-HC2 to GigaVUE-OS 5.10.xx, add the 5.9.01.16 hot patch to increase the allowed image size to support the upgrade.

*****5.10.03 on GigaVUE-HC3**: When upgrading GigaVUE-HC3 to GigaVUE-OS 5.13.xx or 5.15.xx, upgrade to 5.10.04 to increase the allowed image size to support the upgrade.

Upgrade Summary – Clustered Nodes

This section summarizes the upgrade procedure for nodes operating in a cluster.

The upgrade procedure for an individual node in a cluster is nearly identical to that for a standalone node. The only difference is that instead of reloading individual nodes as you upgrade them, you perform a single **cluster reload** after the leader has completed the image upgrade. For instructions about how to upgrade individual nodes, refer to Upgrading GigaVUE-OS Nodes Using GigaVUE-OS CLI.

Note that a GigaVUE-OS TA Series can never be a leader in a cluster configuration. However since the GigaVUE-OS versions are shared amongst the GigaVUE-OS nodes, it is important to upgrade all nodes per instructions prior to using the **cluster reload** command.

Licensing for Clustered Nodes in GigaVUE-OS

The license required for the clustering feature is Advanced Features License (AD_Features) in the GigaVUE TA Series devices.

- When upgrading to GigaVUE-OS v6.2.xx, if the node already has a Clustering License, it will automatically be updated to Advanced Features License (AD_Features) upon upgrade.
- If a license has not been generated yet, or if an earlier version of the license has been generated but not yet installed, then you need to generate (or regenerate) a license from the Gigamon Community portal after upgrading to 6.2.xx. Install and activate the new license.

Note: The license requirement for clustering changed in GigaVUE-OS 5.4.00. If you are upgrading to 5.4.00 from a previous release, the name changed from "Clustering License" to "Advanced Features License". However, the instructions remain the same.

Upgrade Sequence

Gigamon recommends the following upgrade sequence for clusters:

- 1. Use the **write memory** command on each node in the cluster to preserve settings that are stored locally rather than globally (for example, AAA and hostname settings).
- 2. Use the **image delete <filename.img>** command to delete all the available image files.

Note: Use the **show images** command to verify if there are any images existing on the node.

3. On the individual nodes including the leader, fetch and install 6.2.xx software image and bootloader, and set the next boot.

Note: Do not reload the nodes as you upgrade them.

4. Use the **cluster reload** command from the leader to reestablish the cluster settings.

Note: The time it takes for the cluster to complete the cluster reload and reestablish packet distribution will vary depending on the number of nodes in the cluster and the complexity of the packet distribution to restore. An average cluster reload will interrupt traffic for five minutes. However, an eight-node cluster with complex packet distribution in place can take as long as 20 minutes to reload completely.

Note: After reloading the cluster, use the **show cluster global brief** command to determine the roles assigned to each node in the cluster.

5. After completing the upgrade, run the **show version** command on each node in the cluster to make sure they are all running a 6.2.xx build. If any node does not show the correct version number, upgrade it individually.

Figure 1Cluster Upgrade Summary summarizes the cluster upgrade sequence.




Figure 1 Cluster Upgrade Summary

Adding a New Node to an Existing Cluster

Before adding a new node to a cluster, make sure that the node is upgraded to the same version as other nodes in the cluster.

Note: For a GigaVUE-OS TA Series nodes, ensure that the applicable licenses are activated.

Bootloader Code by GigaVUE-OS Release

Gateway Ports Converted to Tool Ports

During an upgrade to 4.7.xx or higher release (from a prior software version), gateway ports and gateway mirrors are automatically converted to tool ports and tool mirrors.

Refer to the following notes and considerations for GigaVUE-OS TA Series nodes starting in software version 4.7.00 (including GigaVUE-OS-TA10, GigaVUE-OS-TA40, GigaVUE-OS-TA100, and Certified Traffic Aggregation White Box):

- Gateway ports on GigaVUE-OS TA Series nodes are removed and converted to tool ports. In addition, gateway mirrors are removed and converted to tool mirrors.
- Tool ports on GigaVUE-OS TA Series nodes can continue to be used to aggregate traffic.
- Tool ports on GigaVUE-OS TA Series nodes can also be used to directly connect to tools, such as firewalls, Intrusion Prevention Systems, or Application Performance Monitors.
- GigaVUE-OS TA Series nodes support network, tool, stack, and hybrid port types.
- Hybrid ports are fully supported in both standalone and cluster mode on GigaVUE-OS TA Series nodes. When a GigaVUE-OS TA Series node is in a cluster, hybrid ports can be configured.
- GigaVUE-OS TA Series nodes can continue to be clustered with GigaVUE-OS H Series nodes. Tool ports are supported on GigaVUE-OS TA Series nodes in a cluster.
- When GigaVUE-OS TA Series nodes are in a cluster, bidirectional traffic flow is enabled on the stack links of GigaVUE-OS TA Series nodes.

Upgrading GigaVUE-OS Nodes

Use the procedures in this chapter to upgrade GigaVUE-OS H Series and GigaVUE-OS TA Series nodes to GigaVUE-OS 6.2.xx.

To begin, prepare the GigaVUE-OS nodes for upgrade by following the procedure in Important: Back Up Your Configuration.

Note: If your nodes and GigaVUE-FM instance are running software version 5.6.xx or earlier, ensure that you add all the nodes to GigaVUE-FM, upgrade the GigaVUE-FM to 6.2.xx, and then upgrade the nodes to 6.2.xx. This is to ensure that the flexible inline maps added to the nodes before the upgrade are visible in the canvas in GigaVUE-FM. For the recommended upgrade path, refer to Supported Upgrade Path—Standalone Nodes.

Important: Back Up Your Configuration

- 1. Copy the 6.2.xx installation file to your file server.
- 2. Use the **write memory** command on each node in the cluster to preserve settings that are stored locally rather than globally (for example, AAA and hostname settings).

Back up the running configuration using either of the following methods:

Back Up by Copying and Pasting	(config) # show running-config This command displays the commands necessary to recreate the node's running configuration on the terminal display. You can copy and paste the output from this command into a text file and save it on your client system. The file can later be pasted back into the CLI to restore the configuration.
Back up to FTP/TFTP/SCP/SFT P Server	<pre>(config) # configuration text generate active running upload <upload url=""> <filename> This command uses FTP, TFTP, SCP, or SFTP to upload the running configuration to a text file on remote storage. The format for the <upload url=""> is as follows: [protocol]://username [:password]@hostname/path/filename</upload></filename></upload></pre>
	For example, the following command uploads a text configuration file based on the active running configuration and uploads it to an FTP server at 192.168.1.49 with the name config.txt : (config) # configuration text generate active running

uploadftp://myuser:mypass@192.168.1.49/ftp/confi g.txt

Upgrading GigaVUE-OS Nodes Using GigaVUE-OS CLI

Refer to the following sections to upgrade GigaVUE-OS H Series and GigaVUE-OS TA Series nodes:

- Install U-Boot (If a Newer Version is Available)
- Install Coreboot (If a Newer Version is Available)
- Verify Version Numbers

Before You Begin

Before you start installing the software image, perform the following checks:

- Change Default admin Password
- Check Number of Images
- Check U-Boot Version
- Check Coreboot Version

Change Default admin Password

Check the password on the **admin** account. If you are using the default password on this account (admin123A!), the best practice is to change it to a non-default password before you upgrade. Refer to the Password Policies section in the *GigaVUE-OS CLI Reference Guide* for more details.

When the upgrade is complete and the node has rebooted, log in with your non-default password.

If you have not changed the default password before the upgrade, when the upgrade is complete and the node has rebooted, you will be prompted to enter a non-default password. The **jump-start** script will automatically launch and prompt the system administrator to change the password on the **admin** account.

Check Number of Images

Check the number of images currently available for installation on the node with the following command:

(config) # show images

The maximum number of images allowed on GigaVUE HC Series or GigaVUE TA Series nodes at any one time is three.

If there is already the maximum number of images listed in the **Images available to be installed** section of the **show images** output, use the **image delete** command to remove at least one of the existing images before you fetch a new one.

The recommendation is to delete any unused images.

Note: Once an image is installed, you can delete the uploaded image.

Check U-Boot Version

If you are upgrading from an older software version, check the U-Boot version using the following command:

(config) # show version

For example on a GigaVUE-HC2 node, the following output is displayed:

U-Boot version: 2011.06.8

Check that the U-Boot version matches the version listed in Software Image Filenames for GigaVUE-OS in the Bootloader Version column.

If you do not have the same version, you will have to do a U-Boot installation, after the image installation. Refer to Install U-Boot (If a Newer Version is Available).

Check Coreboot Version

If you are upgrading from an older software version, check the coreboot version using the following command:

(config) # show version

For example on a GigaVUE-OS-TA100 node, the following output is displayed:

1st flash version: coreboot-ta100-0.2.4 Wed Jan 20 15:19:09 CST 2016 **2nd flash version: coreboot-ta100-0.2.5 Fri Sep 25 19:54:15 CST 2015

Check that the coreboot version matches the version listed in Software Image Filenames for GigaVUE-OS in the Coreboot Version column.

If you do not have the same version, you will have to do a coreboot installation, after the image installation. Refer to Install Coreboot (If a Newer Version is Available).

Install the Software Image

- 1. Log in on the GigaVUE-OS node to be updated as an admin user and switch to Configure mode.
- 2. Use the **image fetch** command to retrieve the software image from your file server. For example, the following command uses SCP to retrieve the **hc16.2.00** image from the **builds** folder on 192.168.1.25:

(config) # image fetch scp://user:password@192.168.1.25/builds/hc16.2.00.img

The CLI shows you the progress of the image fetch with a series of hash marks, returning you to the system prompt when complete.

3. Use the **image install** command to install the downloaded image file. For example, to install the image downloaded in the previous step:

(config) # image install hc16.2.00.img

The GigaVUE-OS CLI presents a series of status messages as it verifies and uncompresses the image, creates file systems, and extracts the image, returning you to the system prompt when complete.

4. The next step is to tell the GigaVUE-OS node which node image to load at the next system boot. The GigaVUE-OS node has two partitions, each of which has a separate image installed. When you install a new image, it automatically installs on the "next" partition – the one you are not using now. The **image boot next** command tells the GigaVUE-OS node to boot from the next partition after the one currently booted – the one where you just installed the new image:

(config) # image boot next

Note: In order for sync to work properly following a reload, ensure that the installation file for the active configuration is present after the **image boot next** command in the previous step.

5. Save the current configuration with the following command:

(config) # write mem

- 6. Is this node part of a cluster?
 - **No** Reboot with the following command.

(config) # reload

When the node comes back up, save the configuration with **write memory**.

- **Yes** Is this the last node in the cluster?
- No Do not the reload at this time. Proceed to upgrade the next node in the cluster.
- Yes If this the last node to be upgraded in the cluster (that is, it is the leader), reload the cluster using the following CLI command.

(config) # cluster reload

7. Save the current configuration with the following command:

(config) # write mem

Bootloader Installation

GigaVUE-FM supports the installation of bootloader on GigaVUE HC Series and GigaVUE TA Series nodes during the GigaVUE-OS image upgrade, but it does not automatically activate it.

Note: Depending on your configuration, you may need to enable physical bypass mode before performing the GigaVUE-OS image upgrade, and then restore it after the upgrade is complete.

During the GigaVUE-OS image upgrade, GigaVUE-FM v5.6.xx (and above) first upgrades the GigaVUE-OS image and then reboots the system. After the GigaVUE HC Series or GigaVUE TA Series node has rebooted with the new GigaVUE-OS image, the bootloader installation will automatically initiate from GigaVUE-FM.

Note: The bootloader upgrade will only apply if there is a bootloader version change in the specific GigaVUE-OS software release.

When the process completes, a message about the bootloader installation will appear in the GigaVUE-FM Task Log Details, such as, "New bootloader version may have been staged based on device bootloader version. Any future reload of device will pick the new version." This means that the bootloader binary has been installed on the device and is ready to become active upon the next reload.

Important: The newer bootloader version only goes into effect after an additional manual reboot. You must explicitly reload the GigaVUE-OS H series or GigaVUE-OS TA series device to update the bootloader version. This additional reboot will cause the optical-protection switches of relevant the Bypass Modules to change states multiple times (close > open > close > open). (Table 1 provides the list of relevant modules.) **Recommendation**: To avoid this state-change behavior, enable the physical bypass before performing the GigaVUE-OS image upgrade.

Refer to"**Configure Inline Bypass Examples**" section in the *GigaVUE-OS CLI Reference Guide* for instructions on how to enable the physical bypass.

Install U-Boot (If a Newer Version is Available)

After checking the U-Boot version, if a newer version is available, you will have to do a U-Boot installation.

Install U-Boot after the image installation if it does not match the Bootloader Version column in Software Image Filenames for GigaVUE-OS. Use this procedure in particular when you are upgrading from an older software version.

After the image installation of 6.2.xx, use the following command (type **uboot** in full):

(config) # show uboot

If there is a newer U-Boot version available, the output of the **show uboot** command displays it. For example in the following output, the installed U-Boot is 2011.06.8, but 2011.06.9 is available for installation.

* Installed U-Boot binary: 2011.06.8 (Dec 06 2016 - 04:35:29)* U-Boot binary from active/booted image: 2011.06.9 (Feb 09 2017-02:16:26)

If there is a newer U-Boot version available, use the following command to install it:

(config) # uboot install

The binary bootloader code included with the installed image is installed.

Note: The newer U-Boot version only goes into effect after a reload

Uboot Update Notification for Gen3 GS card in Standalone Mode:

When you try to execute any CLI command when uboot update is in progress, you will get the following notification during bootup or card configuration.

% GS Card uboot upgrade is happening. Cannot execute CLI command now

You cannot execute any CLI command until the uboot update is complete or until a timer of 15 minutes expires.

Install Coreboot (If a Newer Version is Available)

After checking the coreboot version, if a newer version is available, you will have to do a coreboot installation.

Install coreboot after the image installation if it does not match the Coreboot Version column in Software Image Filenames for GigaVUE-OS. Use this procedure in particular when you are upgrading from an older software version.

After the image installation of 6.2.xx, use the following command:

(config) # show version

If there is a newer coreboot version available, the output of the **show version** command displays it.

If there is a newer coreboot version available, use the following command to install it:

(config) # coreboot install

The binary bootloader code included with the installed image is installed.

Note: The newer coreboot version only goes into effect after a reload.

Verify Version Numbers

After completing the upgrade to GigaVUE-OS 6.2.xx, run the **show version** command on all upgraded nodes to make sure they are all running a 6.2.xx build. If any node does not show the correct version number, upgrade it individually.

Upgrade Software on a GigaVUE-OS Node or a Cluster from GigaVUE-FM

This section describes the steps to upgrade the software on GigaVUE-OS nodes and clusters using GigaVUE-FM. You can upgrade software by using an image that is located on an external image server, or you can use GigaVUE-FM as the image server for H Series and TA Series nodes.

Note: When using GigaVUE-FM to upgrade software on the nodes, it is imperative that the minimum version on the node be at version 4.3.xx. If the software is not updated to version 4.3.xx, use either the CLI or GigaVUE-FM at the node level to upgrade the node to the latest revision.

Refer to the following sections

- Before You Begin
- Upgrade from an External Image Server
- Upgrade with GigaVUE-FM as the Image Server

Before You Begin

Before upgrading a node or a cluster, it is important to note the following:

• GigaVUE-FM can upgrade up to 32 nodes at a time. For example, if you select a cluster with 8 nodes and 28 standalone nodes, GigaVUE-FM will fail to upgrade as the total number of nodes exceeds the limit.

- Check if the device that you want to upgrade has enough disk space. Disk space is computed based on the last synchronized time. A newly added node may sometimes show low disk space. Wait for approximately 5 minutes for the configuration sync to complete or rediscover the device and then check the disk space.
- When the upgrade process is complete, a post-upgrade sanity check is performed. Physical inventory snapshot of nodes, cards, ports, maps, and GigaSMART operations are captured and the numbers from before and after the upgrade are compared. Sometimes, these numbers do not match immediately after the upgrade, as the device is still being configured. GigaVUE-FM checks every minute whether the nodes have joined the cluster. If the nodes joined do not increment in 30 minutes, then the sanity check will fail.

After the nodes join the cluster, GigaVUE-FM again checks every minute for other configuration objects to come up. If the configuration objects do not increment in 10 minutes, the sanity check will fail. When the sanity check fails, GigaVUE-FM provides an ability to view the configuration object that failed the sanity check.

 GigaVUE-FM v5.5.00 supports the installation of bootloader on GigaVUE HC Series and GigaVUE TA Series nodes during the GigaVUE-OS image upgrade, but it does not automatically activate it.

Note: Depending on your configuration, you may need to enable physical bypass mode before performing the GigaVUE-OS image upgrade, and then restore it after the upgrade is complete.

During the GigaVUE-OS image upgrade, GigaVUE-FM v5.5.00 first upgrades the GigaVUE-OS image and then reboots the system. After the GigaVUE HC Series or GigaVUE TA Series node has rebooted with the new GigaVUE-OS image, the bootloader installation will automatically initiate from GigaVUE-FM.

Note: The bootloader upgrade will apply only if there is a bootloader version change in the specific GigaVUE-OS software release.

When the installation process completes, a message about the bootloader installation will appear in the GigaVUE-FM Task Log Details.

IMPORTANT: The newer bootloader version only goes into effect after an additional manual reboot. You must explicitly reload the GigaVUE-OS H series or GigaVUE-OS TA series device to update the bootloader version. This additional reboot will cause the optical-protection switches of the relevant Bypass Modules to change states multiple times.

RECOMMENDATION: To avoid this state-change behavior, enable the physical bypass before performing the GigaVUE-OS image upgrade. Refer to "Configuring Inline Bypass Examples: Protected Inline Bypass Using Bypass Combo Modules" in the *GigaVUE-OS CLI Reference Guide* for instructions on how to enable the physical bypass.

Note: Starting in GigaVUE-OS software version 4.7, the default password admin123A! for the admin user is no longer valid when logging in to the node. When upgrading from the CLI, the configuration jump-start script requires the user to change the default password for the admin user. However, if the node is upgraded to software version 4.7 or later using GigaVUE-FM, the admin password on the node is not changed.

Upgrade from an External Image Server

This section provides the steps for upgrading the GigaVUE-OS nodes and clusters from an image stored on an external server. The image can be transferred from the server to the node using either SCP or TFTP file protocols.

In a cluster configuration, to upgrade the software on the GigaVUE-OS nodes, all the relevant images must be available to GigaVUE-FM. All nodes should be updated to the same version of software.

To upgrade a node or a cluster from an image stored on an external image server, do the following:

1. Upload the image to the external image server to make it available to GigaVUE-FM.

To obtain software images, register on the Gigamon Customer Portal and download the software. You must provide the serial number for each node you want to update.

To view the chassis serial number, login to GigaVUE-FM and select **Chassis** from the navigation pane. Click **List View**.

- 2. Click **Physical** on the top navigation link.
- 3. On the Physical Nodes page, select one or more nodes or clusters to upgrade.
- 4. Select Actions > Image Upgrade.
- 5. Enter the following information:

Note: If the disk space of a physical node or a node in a cluster is low, a message is displayed indicating that the node will not be upgraded due to low disk space.

Upgrade with GigaVUE-FM as the Image Server

This section provides the steps for upgrading the GigaVUE-OS nodes and clusters when GigaVUE-FM is used as the file server instead of an external server.

Note: Only H Series and TA Series devices can be upgraded using GigaVUE-FM as the image server. To upgrade G Series devices with GigaVUE-FM, you must use an external server.

To upgrade a node or a cluster using internal image files, do the following:

1. Download the images from the Gigamon website and place them where they can be available for uploading to GigaVUE-FM.

To obtain software images, register on the Gigamon Customer Portal and download the software. You must provide the serial number for each node you want to update.

To view the chassis serial number, login to GigaVUE-OS and select **Chassis** from the navigation pane. Click **List View**.

- 2. Click **Physical** on the top navigation link.
- 3. On the Physical Nodes page, select one or more nodes or clusters to upgrade.

4. Select Actions > Image Upgrade. Under Selected Nodes, the disk space, software version, and hardware type of all the nodes are displayed. When you upgrade a GigaSMART card, under Selected Nodes, additional details like the GigaSMART Build Number, Related GigaSMART Group, GigaSMART Version, GigaSMART Build Date, and GigaSMART Build Release of all the nodes are also displayed. If a device has multiple engine ports then, the GigaSMART card details for all the ports will be displayed.

Note: If the disk space of the selected node or a node in the cluster is low, a message will be displayed indicating that the node will not be upgraded due to low disk space. Delete the unused internal image files to free up the disk space.

5. Enter the following information:

6. Click **Upgrade**.

Note: When you change the IP address of the GigaVUE-FM instance using the jumpstart configuration, the internal database and the in-memory caches of the GigaVUE-FM instance are not updated. The Database continues to have the IP address of the old GigaVUE-FM, and the image upgrade using the internal server option does not work. To fix this, you must restart the GigaVUE-FM instance after upgrade.
